Liberating Love

Our worship theme this month is Liberating Love. As I sat down to write this, I must admit that I struggled a bit. I was not raised to see love as something that freed or liberated, especially since I identify as a woman. I was brought up to see love as a leash, a way to control me, a burden. All types of love were paid for in sacrifice. I had

never experienced anything differently, and by my early twenties, I was traveling down the same path that the women in my family had

carved for generations. I believed that love was something you must earn. I would only be worthy of love if I suffered and toiled for that love.

I'd like to say that I saw the errors of my way on my own, but it's simply not true. Due to circumstances beyond my control, I was thrust into an environment I had never dreamed of. I was

suddenly surrounded with new possibilities and new ideas and new people. People who saw my inherent worth more than I ever had. They helped change me, helped me to understand that love was a gift--a joy--and that I was more than worthy of it. I began walking my own path, finding my own way. Every time I

think that I've finally got this lesson learned, something happens that makes me learn another layer about Love. Finding my best friend was one, finding my partner was

another. Finding this church was yet another.

This congregation is constantly illustrating how love is safe, how love can help, how love can help, how love can overcome our differences, and how love will ultimately save us.



January Split the Plate Offering: YAIPak Outreach (Tornado Relief in Middle and West Tennessee) with

Every Sunday we share our offering 50/50 with a local agency chosen by our members during a vote at the Congregational Meeting each June. Each year, members chose nine organizations, leaving three months open for emergency needs. The Executive Team recently voted to direct the January Split the Plate offering to Tornado Relief in Middle and West Tennessee, specifically YAIPak Outreach. Named for their motto, "You Are Important," YAIPak Outreach is a non-profit local to the Clarksville region that, in normal times, operates a free household "shopping" warehouse, works



with unhoused people and those transitioning to housing, provides new foster children with clothing and school supplies, and more. Since the tornado outbreak in December, their volunteers have been on the ground serving area residents. As needs have shifted from chainsaws, work gloves, and generators to clothes, household items, toiletries, and space heaters, YAIPak has kept pace with the day to day needs of survivors in the area. We here at ORUUC can help the residents of Middle Tennessee recover from this devastating storm by supporting YAIPak's work. You can learn more at

Last Thursday, when I realized that this week would see temperatures approaching 0°, I contacted most of the people that I know in this church in hopes that we could open the church doors as a warming center for the community's unhoused. With a great deal of help from TORCH, numerous churches in Oak Ridge, and upwards of 40 volunteers, we were able to operate 24 hours a day beginning last Monday, Jan. 15 and ending this upcoming Monday, Jan. 22.

In that time, we welcomed five regular guests and provided them with food, showers, and a place to sleep; TORCH also provided a mom and her two young children with a hotel room, and thanks to an overwhelming abundance of food donations, we sent them on their way with close to a week's worth of food. Food donations were so abundant that we sent a trunk full of food to help feed people staying at the Magnolia Avenue warming center.

From the beginning of this campaign, I've been sharing the link to the TORCH donations page because I wanted everyone who needed help to leave with something of value, and the community raised close to \$2,000.

Of course, none of this could have happened without a lot of hard work, and most of that work was done by Amanda Branche and Christina Elliott. The democratic process can be slow and messy, but they held true to their principles and to the principles of the U.U. faith that acknowledge the value of every person, and in the end, they saw this vision to its completion.

Reverend Lisa, thank you for believing in this idea and for believing some weird dude you've never met when he said that this would work out just fine. Thank you to all the volunteers, especially the ones who stayed awake in shifts overnight and the ones who drove people and supplies around town in absolutely terrible conditions. Ensuring that we had enough volunteers to have two of them in the church at all times for a week was definitely the biggest challenge for pulling this off, and y'all pulled it off.

Thank you to everyone who donated anything and ensured that no one went without this week.

Thank you Allison Morgan and TORCH. This would absolutely be impossible without you.




Now on Exhibit in the ORUUC Gallery: Photography by Bob McLaren

Helen Jernigan July 31, 1925 – January 18, 2024



Helen Chastain Jernigan, 98, of Oak Ridge passed away January 18, 2024, at Canterfield Senior Living in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. She had retired as a clerk of the courts and was a noted political activist.

Helen was born July 31, 1925, in Pleasant Hill, Cumberland County, Tennessee, the only child of the late Will and Nota Hamby Chastain. She graduated from Pleasant Hill Academy and Tennessee Wesleyan College, with studies in music and English. In 1944, she took a summer job in Happy Valley, the satellite construction community of 13,000 for the building of the K-25 facility west of Oak Ridge. After college, she returned to Oak Ridge and was employed by Union Carbide Corp. as an editor of The Carbide Courier, K-25's company newspaper. Many of her wartime experiences are documented in an oral history interview on the AtomicHeritage YouTube website. Search "Helen Jernigan." After the end of World War II, she worked as office manager for the local office of Bush Building Company and later managed the office of Oak Ridge physicians Cordell Williams and Harry Helm.

In 1965, Helen and her first husband, the late Edward Fairstein, founded Tennelec, Inc., in Oak Ridge, a precision scientific instrument company. The instruments are used worldwide and in outer space. She served as corporate secretary of that company for 12 years, also serving as public affairs officer and editor of The Scanner, a company newsletter. During this period, she worked part-time for The Oak Ridger, reporting local government activities, and founding and writing the action-line column "Ask Incky" with her friend, the late Mary Smyser.

Following the sale of Tennelec to The Nucleus in the late '70s, she began work at Oak Ridge National Laboratory as an editor in the Energy Division, assigned to the Solar and Special Studies group. Working with the late Cresson Kearny, she edited his book entitled Nuclear War Survival Skills.

With friend and partner, the late Dorothy DeBerry Gibson Levin, she established The Pine Tree, a women's clothing shop on New York Ave. in Oak Ridge, which the pair operated for 13 years.

Helen was elected in 1984 to the office of Anderson County Circuit Court Clerk, serving Circuit, Criminal, General Sessions, and Juvenile courts. She was re-elected to two more four-year terms, retiring in 1994. During her tenure in that office, she was appointed to the board of directors of the Tennessee State Court Clerk's Association and compiled and edited a History and Directory for that organization.

Anderson County District 7 Chancellor Primary Election Forum

On March 5, Anderson County will hold the Presidential Preference and County Primaries election. Of interest is the election of Chancellor for District 7 who serves Anderson County. Currently, the position is held by James W. Brooks, Jr., who has held this position since April 2023 after the departure of Judge M. Nichole "Nicki" Cantrell. Mr. Brooks was appointed by Gov. Bill Lee to serve until an election could be held.

In February 2023, The Trial Court Vacancy Commission held a public hearing to interview six candidates for the position with four candidates being placed on the ballot for the Republican Primary. The four candidates are: James W. Brooks, Jr. (incumbent), Daniel Forrester, Evan Hauser and Roger Miller.

The Anderson County Chancery Court hears cases such as adoptions, orders of protection, child support, child custody and divorce; all family law matters as well as lawsuits and contract disputes. Additionally, the court can hear Criminal Court cases and the Judge can sit at the Circuit Court and hear Juvenile Court appeals.

This forum will follow the League's normal procedures with one exception. Since this is a primary and all of the candidates for this position are representing the Republican party, there will be no empty chair stipulation.

Candidates will answer questions sent prior to the forum. Additional questions from the audience will be gathered by cards at the forum and will be vetted by the League for respectfulness to each candidate and appropriateness to this election



Sunday, Feb. 4 If You See a Good Fight, Get In It



The title is a quote by the Rev. Dr. Vernon Johns, a pioneer in the American Civil Rights movement. And, like all pioneers (especially the feisty ones), he faced immense hardships and intense headwinds. But Dr. Johns' story has resonance today, especially for a church in search of a new pastor. Rev. Lisa Romantum Schwartz, ORUUC's interim minister, tells his story.
