ORUUC Welcomes Lóre Stevens as Minister **July 17!**



Last Sunday, April 28, 122 members showed up for worship and the in-person vote that followed to call Lóre to serve as the next minister of our congregation. The results of the paper ballot vote were as follows: 118 - yes, 1 - no, and 3 blank responses.

How to Keep a Minister Rev. Lisa Romantum Schwartz, Interim Minister

A hearty congratulations to ORUUC for a stellar call of Lóre Stevens to be your next settled minister! I shower you all with blessings as you prepare to begin this next chapter of strong and engaged ministry.

Your church has a wonderful foundation of excellent long-term ministry. And, since Rev. Jake and Rev. Tandy began serving ORUUC, a lot has changed in UU ministry. It's now rare for congregations and ministers to partner for longer than about seven years. Having just been through the search process, I know you want to keep Lóre in a vibrant partnership for longer than that!

The Rev. Dr. Matthew Johnson, who's served the UU church in Rockford, Illinois for over 15 years, wrote a great article a few years ago about how churches maximize their chances of a fruitful, long-term partnership with a minister. Here are some of his ideas, in my first installment of a series of Exponent articles titled, "How to Keep a Minister."

Johnson has a self-assessment tool for congregations with five areas. A church adds up its points, with higher point values being better predictors of success at keeping a minister. See how you'd rate ORUUC in his first two areas:

Mission

4. The church has a strong sense of mission, to change lives in and out of the church.

- 3. The church is a beacon for liberal values, and many people are engaged in outward ministry.
- 2. The church is a refuge for liberal people, and some work in the community for
- 1. The church is a club-house and resists any effort to change the world, let alone the gathered people.

Participation

4. Many people joyfully participate in worship, leadership, and social activities.

> The minister has strong partners in the ministry.

- 3. There is a core of active leaders in many areas.
- 2. Though there are some good leaders, the minister is expected to drive most of the ministry.
- 1. Members see themselves as consumers of the ministry, not co-creators or owners of the church. (Unless there is conflict with the minister.)

I'd give ORUUC high scores in both of these areas, yet I'm aware that my subjective scoring is much less important than your own! It's worthy of some conversation among you, especially leaders and emerging leaders, about where you'd put ORUUC on the above scales. I look forward to engaging in the process with you!

May Split the Plate Offering: Anderson County Family Justice Center

Every Sunday we share our offering 50/50 with a local agency chosen by our members during a vote at the Congregational Meeting each June. This month, the recipient is the Anderson County Family Justice Center.

The Anderson County Family Justice Center is a free, confidential safe space that assists survivors of elder abuse, sexual assault, domestic violence, exploitation, and child abuse. Staff help survivors create a safety plan, find emergency shelter, and obtain an order of protection in the most dangerous hours for a



victim leaving an abusive environment. They also provide space for survivors to meet with law enforcement, prosecutors, and counselors. FJC helps survivors grow and thrive after their trauma by helping with transportation, resume writing, and referrals to other agencies.




Wine and Winds Saturday, June 1 at 3:30 p.m. at ORUUC

Jean Newton Box (June 13, 1925 - April 26, 2024)



Jean Newton Box, age 98, passed away peacefully on Friday April 26, 2024 at Commonwealth Assisted Living in Oak Ridge, TN. Mrs. Box and her family have appreciated her longevity and the love and friendship she has experienced from so many persons throughout her life. She has written this obituary herself.

Jean Newton Box was born in Maywood, Illinois, June 13, 1925, to Leon and Viola Newton. He was a locomotive engineer and she was an elementary school teacher. Jean grew up in this western suburb of Chicago in a musical family. At nine, she moved from piano to flute, which she played into her nineties.

She graduated from Cornell College in Iowa in 1947 with a major in Sociology and a plan to become a social worker. Her first position after college was in an American Friends Service Committee student program for attendants at the New Jersey Psychiatric Hospital in Trenton. There she met another student who was learning about counseling in mental illness. That was Howard Box who was attending Yale University preparing for the ministry. They kept in touch through their further education and first jobs and married in 1952. She found the position of minister's wife quite to her liking and saw the opportunity to use her social work skills in their congregations.

The Unitarian Church in Newburgh, NY, was the first of four congregations Rev. and Mrs. Box lived in. They then moved to the Unitarian Church in Ottawa, Canada. It was an interesting experience to live in another country. Daughter Ruth and son Gordon were both born there and have dual Canadian and American citizenship. Howard was serving their next congregation when Carol was born. It was very similar to the Unitarian denomination: the Society for Ethical Culture in Brooklyn, NY. Through most of her life, Jean had various part-time jobs in social work or positions on boards. And in Brooklyn she and two other members used their musical skills to perform together for their own and other congregations in the NY City area. The last congregation that Howard served was The Unitarian Universalist Church of Oak Ridge, TN, starting in 1976. In this city Jean was in the Community Band, the Symphony Orchestra, played solos and accompanied the church choir. She gave private flute lessons to 150 students in the Music Arts School from 1980 to 2000. Rev. Box retired in 1991. They continued to live active lives in Oak Ridge. In 2018 they moved into Commonwealth Senior Living where Howard died in 2021 after 69 years of marriage.

The Boxes are survived by daughter Ruth Westfall of Mahomet, IL, son Gordon Box (Betsy Williams) of Durham, NC, and Carol Box (Alessandro Nicita) in Switzerland; he works for the United Nations Headquarters in Geneva. Grandchildren are Robert Westfall, and Sofia and Matteo Nicita.

There will be a family memorial service at a later time with burial in the Memorial Garden of the Oak Ridge Unitarian Universalist Church in Oak Ridge, TN.
